## **Activities**

- The peddler became angry when the monkey took his hat. Work on a mad/glad list with your child. Divide a sheet of paper in half and write the word "Mad" at the top of one column and the word "Glad" at the top of the other column. Encourage all family members to list or draw pictures of things that make them "mad or "glad."
- Play a "copycat" game when you and your child are waiting in line. Do two or three things, such as touching your nose, elbow, and shoulder. Ask your child to be a "copycat" and repeat what you did. Reverse roles and copy your child's moves.
