Activities

- Ask your child the name of the current president. Give the president's name if your child doesn't know it. Look at pictures in magazines or newspapers of the president and discuss with your child what the president is doing in those pictures.
- Look at pictures of presidents on \$1, \$5, \$10, and \$20 bills with your child. Fingerspell the name of the president on each bill or ask your child to fingerspell their names (e.g., \$1 = Washington, \$5 = Lincoln, \$10 = Hamilton, \$20 = Jackson).
- Ask your child this question: If you were the president of the United States, what would you do for the people? Tell your child to list what he or she would do.
