Activities

- Have your child make a picture book about the environment. Cut out pictures relating to
 the environment from magazines and paste them onto sheets of paper. Fold the pages in
 half to make a book, then label each picture in it. Write a title on the book's cover and put
 down your child's name as its author.
- Help your child make a button for Earth Day. Cut out a circle from a piece of cardboard.
 Cut out a picture relating to the earth from a magazine (e.g., trees, flowers, birds) and glue it on the cardboard. Write a motto (e.g., Save the earth!) on the button. Your child can also draw instead of cutting out pictures.
- Have your child list things to do to protect the environment.
