## Activities

- Cut colorful pages out of magazines. Fold the top portion of each page and glue it to a string to make banners as shown in the book. Have your child cut out letters from magazines to form the word "Fiesta." Glue the letters to the banner.
- Draw different objects (e.g., star, sun, flower, etc.) on construction paper. Cut the outline of the drawings similar to the pictures in the book. Have your child label the objects drawn. String them for decoration.
- Explain to your child that fiesta basically means celebration in the Spanish language. Let your child make an acrostic for the word fiesta. Write "fiesta" horizontally on bond paper, then tell your child to think of a word for each letter (e.g., F = fun, I=ice cream, E = enjoy, etc.) that can be associated with the celebration.
