## **Activities**

- Talk about hot weather with your child. Write down ways to keep cool in the heat aside from drinking lemonade (e.g., taking a bath, going swimming). Your child can also draw pictures ofways or activities, or cut out pictures from magazines.
- Ask your child to help you prepare lemonade for the both of you. Together, list the items
  needed to make lemonade. When you have gathered the items needed, let your child read
  to you from the book telling how to make lemonade and follow the directions. Enjoy the
  drink.
- Draw a picture of the sun on a piece of paper. Ask your child to think of words related to the sun (e.g., beach, ice cream, pool). Pick a word and draw, paste a picture of, or write that word in the center of the sun. Then think of words associated with that picture and write them in between the rays of the sun (e.g., the beach--your child can write swimming, sand castles, beach ball, etc.).
