Activities

- If the season permits, take your child outside and go sledding, make snow angels, or make a snowman. If you live in a warmer climate, try making sand angels at the beach.
- Draw a picture of a thermometer and mark where the freezing and boiling points are. Discuss
 why the snowball melted in Peter's coat pocket.
- Make paper snowflakes out of regular or thin white paper. Starting with a square, show your child how to fold the square first in half and then into a triangle. Cut notches and curves in the edges. Unfold and tape to a window. Experiment with different sizes of squares.
